DR. KATIE BINGHAM RECEIVES WAYPOINT'S LARGEST CIHR GRANT





The Waypoint Research Institute is pleased to congratulate <u>Dr. Katie Bingham</u> on her successful CIHR Implementation Science Team Grant. This multi-year project, "Evaluating the implementation, effectiveness and scalability of the Behaviour Success Agent program: Promoting quality integrated dementia care and building capacity in acute care settings", is the largest CIHR grant ever received by a Waypoint researcher, with a total of \$7.48M awarded to 10 research teams.

This implementation study will evaluate barriers and facilitators of the Behaviour Support Agent (BSA) program, an intervention in the North Simcoe Muskoka region's acute care hospitals. The BSA program is designed to promote quality of care for persons with dementia and responsive behaviours, optimizing flow through the health care system and enhancing the capacity of acute care staff to assess and manage dementia with response behaviours. Dr. Bingham recently joined Waypoint in a full-time capacity as a psychiatrist and will be working with the Specialized Geriatric Services team, other WRI researchers, and external partners on this project. Congratulations Dr. Bingham and team!

MAPPING THE WAY TOGETHER: WAYPOINT'S JUNE 6TH FPOR EVENT

On June 6th, 2024, the Forensic Patient-Oriented Research (fPOR) team from the Waypoint Research Institute hosted a collaborative Café Scientifique event, *A Roadmap Towards Forensic Patient-Oriented Research: A Collaborative Dialogue*. As part of a funding program through the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), the goal of a Café Scientifique is to create opportunities for researchers, knowledge users (folks who will benefit from or make use of research), and the public to discuss health research, share their views, and learn from each other. Building on an existing CIHR-funded implementation project focused on developing practices for implementing POR in forensic mental health settings, this Café event both marked a milestone in the broader project, while setting the stage for what is yet to come.




The Café Event took place in a hybrid format, bringing together patients, staff, clinicians, researchers, and members of the public both virtually and in-person on the high-secure side of Waypoint, with approximately 25 virtual and 55 in-person participants. The morning began with a traditional welcome from Austin Mixemong and opening remarks from Yvette Brook of the Patient/Client Family Council (PCFC), Dr. Nadiya Sunderji, and Dr. Christopher Canning. After sharing findings from the fPOR project and a success story from the University of Saskatchewan shared by Dr. Colleen Dell, Dr. Linzi Williamson, and therapy dog Molly, the group moved into deciding upon the afternoon discussion topics through a collaborative activity. Having the group decide what to focus on in the afternoon set the stage for the co-creation of our roadmap towards fPOR, exploring topics such as power and empowerment, building relationships, patient engagement and representation, staff involvement and safety, and more. Participants joined two discussion groups of their choosing, with the day wrapping up with group facilitators sharing back what was discussed in each group and reflections on the day and next steps post-event.

We are so grateful to be involved in such an innovative project and to work with a team that is so passionate about the patient voice. We can't wait to see where this project takes us next!


