>>> WAYPOINT CO-HOSTS A KNOWLEDGE EXCHANGE EVENT EXPLORING CULTURALLY RESPONSIVE APPROACHES TO IPV



A Knowledge Exchange event on Building a Culturally Responsive Approach to Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) was held on March 27th, 2024, in Orillia, Ontario. The event was funded through a Victim Support Grant (VSG) to partners from the Barrie Native Friendship Centre (BNFC), Chiefs of Ontario (COO), the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP), and Waypoint Centre for Mental Health Care. There were over 60 participants representing 26 policing and community service organizations across Ontario.

The day began with a warm welcome and land acknowledgement by OPP Superintendent Jen Spurrell, followed by a smudging ceremony by Charmaine Nolan of the BNFC, and a guided wellness activity led by OPP mental health clinician, Linda Burrell.

Waypoint's **Dr. Zoe Hilton** gave an overview of the research conducted as part of a 25-year collaboration between OPP and researchers at our hospital, including development of the Ontario Domestic Assault Risk Assessment Training (ODARA) program and the current research on Common Language for Intimate Partner Violence Risk Appraisal (**CELIA**) **IPV project**. The OPP's CBAS Research Coordinator Dr. Angela Eke spoke about the Victim Support Grant obtained that supported the development of a partnership whose goal is to begin bridging the gap between this research and the need for specific attention to risk factors for Indigenous communities. Dr. Natalie Snow and Rebekah Ederer from the COO presented on the results of their Risk Assessment Danger Assessment Tools project. They described the cross-province consultation with Indigenous community services, training in several risk assessment and victim safety planning tools including the ODARA, and the approach taken in the new toolkit.

With the support of Charmaine Nolan, Natasha, a peer support lead from the BNFC, shared a personal experience of IPV and her interactions with police and community services. They used an ethical interview approach in which Natasha responded to a series of prepared questions posed by Charmaine. With Charmaine's emotional support, Natasha recounted a small portion of the violence she experienced over an extended period of time and also spoke of her strength and survival, occasions when she received especially helpful support from community services, and areas where police and other services could improve their responses.

The afternoon included two breakout sessions. The first gathered people into tables of either policing services or community services to discuss barriers and challenges they experience in their work to a culturally responsive approach to IPV risk assessment. The second involved mixed tables, so participants could discuss solutions with people from different work settings. The ideas from each table were shared with the larger group and posted around the room, with time given for individuals to build on any points by adding sticky notes with their comments. The breakout groups proved to be highly interactive, with participants discussing and identifying new ideas about how services can interact and collaborate. All the discussion points and suggestions are being reviewed to identify themes and directions in a report that will be shared back with stakeholders and placed on the CELIA website.

This event was an opportunity for a team from Waypoint (**Elke Ham, Kristy Allen, Meghan Weissflog, and Zoe Hilton**) to profile the hospital's research and strengthen community partnerships across the province. The VSG-support will be extended to a national level in June, 2024 when the project team will present a panel discussion at the Canadian Psychological Association conference. It also provides a foundation for increased grant funding, and plans for a new funding application are underway to build on the ideas and momentum from this knowledge exchange day.


DR. ELNAZ MOGHIMI SHARES HER EXPERIENCE ATTENDING #FRAYME2024

As scientists, the responsibilities and logistics of conducting research can sometimes overshadow the core purpose of our endeavors. Conferences like <u>Frayme's 2024 Learning Institute</u> serve as important reminders of the significance and real-world impact of our efforts.

#Frayme2024 provided a unique and engaging experience, stepping away from the conventions of traditional conferences. Gone are the days of exclusive meetings dominated by researchers and clinicians. Instead, the Learning Institute offered a platform for diverse voices, including those who have been historically marginalized. In doing so, our community had a chance to listen and learn from individuals directly impacted by our work.

During the conference's opening plenary, <u>Dr. Soyeon Kim</u> and I engaged in discussions on translating research into practice and closing the current 17-year research gap. While our team provided insights from a researcher and healthcare standpoint, the dialogue was enriched by input from industry experts and youth perspectives. Collaborations like these exemplify the ideal process of knowledge generation.





Integrated into the sessions, the Learning Institute offered opportunities for networking, mental wellbeing activities, and safe spaces to debrief and unpack our conference experiences. Experiencing a sound bath session at a conference for the first time prompted me to ask, "Why did it take so long for mental health-focused conferences to incorporate mental health activities?". If we are going to practice what we preach, conferences like these are excellent starting points.

Overall, #Frayme2024 was an enriching experience and a poignant reminder that regardless of the complexities of research projects, we are part of a collective that shares the same passion towards improving youth mental health. I am grateful to be part of the WRI's commitment to participant-centered research and for their support in our endeavor to develop and advocate for a <u>Preventative Mental Health Program for Youth (POMHPY)</u>. Just as conferences like Frayme embody their principles, it's a privilege to belong to a healthcare organization that upholds the same values in its practices.
